Consumer Reports submits this request for reasonable advocacy fees for our substantial contribution to the decision of the Department of Managed Health Care (DMHC) regarding CVS's acquisition of Aetna. Consumer Reports substantially contributed to DMHC's review of the proposed merger in a variety of ways. On May 2, 2018. Dena Mendelsohn, Senior Policy Counsel at Consumer Reports, provided an oral statement to the Department during which she voiced major concerns held by Consumer Reports regarding the proposed merger of this merger and pharmacy/retail/PBM. For example: - Being a vertical merger does not eliminate competition concerns. - Consolidation benefits the merging parties but the value for consumers is unclear. - Corporate savings from consolidation does not necessarily translate into savings for consumers. - The linkage of consolidation and innovation is unfounded. - A merged corporation could avoid profit regulations. - Merged health plan, pharmacy, and retail establishments may mean worse care for patients.- - The merger of a health plan, pharmacy, and retail establishment raises privacy concerns. In addition to articulating the concerns of Consumer Reports in person, Ms. Mendelsohn provided the Department with a detailed written testimony dated May 7, 2018. This statement included a substantial collection of background information, derived from a literature review and extensive review and analysis of public records and reports, highlighting a pattern of troubling quality issues by both companies. Additionally, in our written testimony, Consumer Reports detailed for the Department seven recommended Undertakings, designed to protect consumer interests in the event that the Department approved the merger. They centered around: 1. Ensuring health insurance rates are fair and justified. 2. Protecting and enhancing provider networks. 3. Improving health plan quality and consumer satisfaction. 4. Protecting consumer privacy. 5. Dedicating staffing to transition issues. Although Consumer Reports is not privy to the closed negotiations between DMHC and the merging corporations, we believe Consumers Reports played an important role in the conversation and that our input is reflected. For example, the following agreements to: - keep premium rate increases to a minimum and not to increase premiums because of the acquisition; - correct all uncorrected deficiencies within twelve months; - improve its performance in meeting geographic access to healthcare providers; - take tangible steps to improve and maintain its OPA star ratings by 2021; and - maintain key functions and management in California for a period of five years;

Mergers in the healthcare sector - especially those that create large corporations that straddle especially wide swaths of how healthcare is accessed, such as with CVS and Aetna – pose a threat of increased premiums, diminished choice, and, in this case, eroded privacy. They also threaten to reduce the insentive to improve quality and innovation. Because this is a complicated and nuanced issue on which Consumer Reports has expertise, both nationally and in California, our mission dictates that we advocate for consumers in order to balance out the robust panel of attorneys representing the plans.


